Red Saunders: *Hidden*

28 September to 10 December 2011

Red Saunders' epic photographs recreate decisive but overlooked events in Britain's struggle for democracy and equality. They celebrate the contributions of ordinary men and women, rather than monarchs and 'Great Men', to present histories that have previously been hidden.

Each scene is carefully planned and lit, using costumed models in the style of *tableaux vivants* (living pictures). Together, they suggest photographic 'evidence' for events that occurred before the widespread adoption of camera technology.

Unveiled for the first time in the exhibition are three works made in Yorkshire featuring local people, specially commissioned for *Ways of Looking* by Impressions Gallery and The Culture Company. These are *Hild of Streonshalh (Hilda of Whitby) 614 - 680*; *The Swing Riots 1830*; and *Leveller Women of the English Revolution 1647*.

Saunders states, 'my hope is that these images can give new life to these important episodes of working people's history'.
