The event is primarily a peer feedback session. The reviewers will offer comments and advice on how to develop your project or ideas. Please note reviewers representing Impressions Gallery are not explicitly trying to find work for the gallery programme.

Frequently asked questions....

What will happen on the day?

The photo review event will run from 10am to 12.00pm. You will be offered two 20-minute sessions within this time window. The time slots you are offered will depend on who is reviewing your work.

There will be a break for all attendees and reviewers between 10.50am and 11.10am.

Who will be reviewing my work?

How much work should I bring?

There is no one rule fits all with the amount of work to bring, it depends on the nature of your work and what stage of a project or idea you are at.

We recommend bringing work from just one main project.

We also suggest editing your images beforehand and thinking about any questions you would like to ask.

Who is this event for?

This event is designed to offer advice and inspiration for early career photographers who want to further develop their practice.

People at many different stages and levels of photographic practice attend our review sessions. Reviewers are always interested to see new work and keen to give advice on possible directions for development. The main thing is that you are open to feedback and dialogue.

How should I present my work?

The presentation of your images will depend on the nature of your work, how far along you are with your ideas and what level you are at within your photographic practice. The reviewers will understand this. Don't feel you need to spend a lot of money on presentation, prints are fine and digital files too.

Consider presenting your work in a way that allows it to be viewed quickly and easily.

Top tips

- Spend some time before the review thinking about your work and what you want to get out of the review.
 - Look at the work of the exhibiting photographers and our website to find out what we do beforehand.
 - Think about any questions you may like to ask about your work, its development and direction, its strengths and weaknesses.
 - Bring a notebook, and make a note of any artists, photographers, books, or exhibitions that may be mentioned to you.
 - The reviewers will offer constructive criticism, so there's no need to be intimidated! Reviewers are actively looking for the potential for improvement within the work – by discussing this they aim to challenge your ideas and help you develop your work, but always in a supportive way.

- Typical questions you might be asked include:
 - How long have you been working on this series of images?
 - How do they relate to work you've taken previously?
 - Is the work complete or do you feel you need to add more?
 - Have you shown the work to anyone else?

- How do you want to present it?
- What made you interested in making work around this subject area?
